

➔ *Everyone has a role to play when it comes to prevention and response to Gender-based Violence*

1. Prevent SEA¹ and ensure high standard conduct of humanitarian partners working in logistics

- Ensure all staffs and volunteers working for logistics are aware of and trained on the code of conduct;
- Ensure contractors have a basic understanding on the code of conduct and humanitarian principles (i.e. all contractors including truck drivers at a minimum must have a contract that has a line on how “they will not engage in any act of SEA” and they should receive informational materials to create awareness);
- Promote feedback mechanisms that are simple, accessible, safe and confidential to the community to report cases of SEA to the different organizations and actors;
- Ensure vehicles, trucks, and any other means of transport (contractor or own service) are clearly identified by the community (logos, etc.).

2. Prioritize items to prevent and respond to GBV

- Ensure quick procurement and delivery of key items to prevent and respond to GBV (e.g. dignity kits, PEP kits and other medical supplies, necessary for the provision of basic clinical care for survivors of GBV, light-torches, street lamps, tents for vulnerable groups, etc.);
- Consider key items that can help prevent and respond to GBV as life-saving items and ensure they are processed with high priority (e.g. PEP kits, light torches);
- Consider local purchase of emergency items, even if more expensive, if it will speed up the delivery of these items for prevention and response of GBV.

3. Support the movement and communication means of staff working to prevent and respond to GBV

- Ensure staff is provided with the means for transport and communication to work in prevention and response of GBV;
- Ensure service providers for survivors of GBV have access to logistic support to provide care and response to critical cases.

4. Come up with creative ways to increase the security of women and children, especially girls

- Ensuring that vehicles, radios/communication, and human resources are available and safe to engage in night patrols;
- Promote alternative and innovative equipment and tools to provide security according to the context (i.e. solar energy for lighting).
